

Here's how it works:

Programs will be scheduled at the mutual convenience of the school and the artist. Please suggest preferred dates and times.

Grades K-2: programs are one hour in length*

Grades 3-12: programs are 1 hour and 15 minutes in length

* This format is recommended also for older students with attention deficits

It is highly desirable for students to visit the Greenbelt Community Center where they can experience art studios, a contemporary art gallery, historical exhibits and more. However, if it is too difficult for your group to come to the Center, all activities except Greenbelt Museum programs can be brought to your school.

One workshop or two?

Single workshop format: (no lunch on site)

Cost: \$70 per class + \$1.50/student for equipment & materials

Two-workshop format: Make a day of it! Students participate in one workshop, break for a brown-bag lunch, then participate in a second activity. Typically, a visual arts program is paired with a history or performing arts program for variety.

Cost: \$150 per class + \$3.00/student for equipment & materials

Physical Education Programs

Juggling Fools Workshop:

Students spend an hour exploring the world of juggling with professional fool and former Ringling Brothers Circus performer Gregory May. Scarves, balls, spinning plates, devil sticks, and more will be demonstrated and taught with an emphasis on how to continue the learning process at home. Benefits: hand-eye coordination, appreciation of rhythms and patterns, and the self-confidence that comes with the development of a new skill.

A fun, active exploration of the three basic elements of dance: time, space and energy.

Drawing on a wide range of expressive and rhythmic movement activities, our dance workshops are designed to get students moving dynamically and thinking creatively. Students are engaged in the learning process visually, kinesthetically, and intellectually.
