

City Manager's Report Week Ending May 18, 2018

1. Celebration of Spring will be held on Saturday, May 19th. Due to inclement weather, the fun will be moved inside the Springhill Lake Recreation Center.
2. The Public Works Open House has been rescheduled from May 19th to June 2nd.
3. Included separately is Budget Update Memo #3.
4. Included separately are copies of letters from the Greenbelt East Advisory Coalition regarding security cameras and Air B&Bs.
5. Attached are copies of a letter from the State requesting access to City property to conduct assessments to support the highway widening initiatives such as I-495/Capital Beltway and I-270 (Traffic Control Plan). As noted during Wednesday evening's open session, there is a deadline for response. The Council's consensus provided at that time was to not allow access. Unless other comment is received by May 25th, staff will return a letter to the state noting that the City will not to allow access given City opposition to highway widening initiative.
6. Attached is the roster of the ULI-TAP Panel selected by ULI. A briefing book on the three communities was mailed to each panelist. The State Highway Administration has confirmed that employees are coordinating calendars to ensure that there is SHA presence during the TAP. I do not have information on who from SHA will be attending. Ms. Anne Marie Belton is working on an electronic invite to send to stakeholders.
7. Ms. Anne Marie Belton has also started working on a July Business Coffee invite. Mayor Jordan had requested that Secretary Rahn be invited as the July speaker.
8. Attached is a letter thanking the Police Department for participation in the February Meal and Reel movie discussion.
9. Ms. Terri Hruby reports that following a walkthrough of multiple agencies, WMATA agrees that the WMATA Trail can be sized for an ambulance or small vehicle, at 9-feet. In addition, Dale Worley reports that WMATA has agreed to supply the security cameras and maintain related footage.

10. Final letters and forms to State and County officials regarding the annexation plan were mailed to complete the South Core correction annexation.
11. In consultation with the City Treasurer Jeff Williams, Assistant City Manager David Moran, and Acting Chief Tom Kemp, a contribution of \$2,500 is being provided to a regional reward for information that would support closure of an unsolved Greenbelt Police case. More information will follow closer to the regional press conference that Greenbelt staff would participate in. In the past, Greenbelt has supplied funds from Crimestoppers and not City funding. However, this funding would come directly from the Department's special projects funds.
12. Attached is the summer camp registration report.
13. Mr. Greg Varda met with HEAL representatives today regarding the criteria necessary to transition from Gold to Platinum participation status. Mr. Varda has confirmed with HEAL representatives that there is different criteria for platinum consideration than previously reported by other staff.
14. In follow-up to Monday evening's Council discussion and as previously reported by email, County Council Vice Chairman Todd Turner confirmed with County staff that the County's Department of Permitting, Inspection, and Enforcement did not issue permits in Greenbelt for the Baltimore Washington Rapid Rail project.
15. Mr. David Moran reports that the City was not successful in obtaining FY2019 Community Playground grant funds. However, the Governor's Office staff identified left over grant funds from other projects and is allocating funds for Greenbelt's GHI playground replacement project. The project is located near 8 Court Southway and projected to cost about \$52,000.
16. In follow-up to the Council's public safety budget work session, Chief Tommy Ray will be forwarding an email on the status of roof repairs. I talked to the Chief this morning and he shared that the County has included funds for the roof in the next year's CIP.
17. In follow-up to Roosevelt Merchants Association feedback provided by Mayor Pro Tem Davis, Mr. Sterling is following up directly with the credit union regarding the special event. Mr. Sterling will also contact the Co-op Grocery and Pharmacy regarding the WSSC project at Roosevelt Center.
18. In follow-up to the update on the Springhill Lake Recreation Center Solar Panel Project, the solar panels will be delivered next week. The panels are estimated to be installed in three days.

19. In follow-up to the update on the Greenbelt Aquatic and Fitness Center, the HVAC unit was anticipated for delivery on May 18th. Given inclement weather, the delivery is now anticipated for Monday, May 21st. However, the delivery date is dependent upon the contractor's scheduling of the crane. The fitness areas are without air conditioning and are closed through the weekend. Next week staff will assess the original plan to open the fitness areas and as needed, to close rooms as work progresses in the facility.
20. Thank you to the Public Safety Advisory Committee and staff as the security camera vendor is onsite migrating cameras. Staff city-wide continue to support the effort, in particular Human Resources, Information Technology, and Police.
21. Met and/or teleconferenced with staff, City Solicitor Todd Pounds, and outside legal counsel regarding personnel, operational and legal matters.
22. Attended the Greenbelt Rotary Club's board meeting.
23. Scheduled to attend the "Celebration of Spring" at Springhill Lake Recreation Center.
24. Assistant City Manager
 - a. Prepared for the Final Budget Work Session.
25. City Treasurer
 - a. Prepared the April 2018 financial report.
 - b. Attended budget meetings – CARES, Code Enforcement, Animal Control and Green Ridge House.

27. Prepared for regular meeting on May 14, budget work sessions on May 15, 16 and 21.



As a resident of the National Capital region, you know first-hand that the region is one of the most congested in the nation with some of the highest commuting times. That's why the Maryland Department of Transportation (MDOT) has introduced an innovative "Traffic Relief Plan" to reduce congestion on Maryland roads, including on two of the state's most heavily traveled highways, I-270 and I-495. The Traffic Relief Plan considers improvements along the entire length of I-495, as well as the entire length of I-270 up to I-70 in Frederick County. In balancing the need for congestion improvements within a highly developed area, one of the Maryland Department of Transportation State Highway Administration's (MDOT SHA) goals is to be considerate of the environment and community.

As part of this undertaking, MDOT SHA is initiating an environmental study to identify innovative transportation solutions to reduce congestion for millions of drivers in your area. This transformative effort will improve the daily lives of citizens and other users by reducing congestion and providing a more reliable drive. The study, which is the first element of the broader Traffic Relief Plan, extends along I-495 from south of the American Legion Bridge in Virginia, to east of the Woodrow Wilson Bridge and along I-270 from I-495 to I-370 including the I-270 east and west spurs, is in the very early stages.

To gain better understanding of the properties, land use, existing environmental conditions and cultural resources, MDOT SHA needs to complete field research and survey activities. These environmental features require MDOT SHA to perform testing, such as soil investigations and ground disturbance. Access to your property may be required several times, intermittently, over a period of one year or more depending on the needs. To perform this testing, we do need your permission and **request that you provide a response to this letter within 30 days** via letter using the included self-addressed, stamped envelope or via email at 495-270-p3@sha.state.md.us.

I sincerely appreciate your patience as, over the next year, our personnel may need to occasionally step onto your property. The representatives will be either MDOT SHA personnel

or consultant personnel, under MDOT SHA direction. All personnel are required to carry identification cards and must display them upon request. If we need to re-enter your property after the year has elapsed, we will contact you again.

To assist us further, it would be helpful if you would point out to our field personnel any considerations on your property (such as underground utilities, freshly planted crops or other features) that might not be readily apparent. If your property is a rental property, we would appreciate your assistance in notifying your tenants of MDOT SHA's need to access the property.

We are committed to delivering an innovative solution to address the daily congestion issue along I-495 and I-270 while minimizing impacts to the community and the environment. To learn more about the study, provide feedback, or ask questions, please visit the website www.495-270-P3.com.





Rental Property: *Nineteen rentals were annually inspected; and Six rentals were re-inspected.*


Windshield Inspections: *Mathew Street and South Ora Court in Windsor Green were observed. Violations noted were tall grass and overgrown weeds.*






