

## City Manager's Report Week Ending April 5, 2019

1. Attached is a flyer for the Greenbelt Volunteer Fire Department & Rescue Squad's Recruitment Open House scheduled for Saturday, April 13 from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m.
2. Also attached is a draft letter to religious organizations regarding crime of mass violence.
3. Thank you to recreation and public works staff who supported last weekend's Unity Walk.
4. Three bids were received and are under review for the Greenbelt Lake Dam repair project.
5. Reminder, staff signed the agreement agreed upon by the Council and Friends of the Old Greenbelt Theatre. Effort should be made for continuity of operations via alternative movie and event locations. This includes unavailable properties.
6. Met with Ms. Palau, Mr. Worley and local Comcast executives interested in the City's exploration of a municipal broadband infrastructure.
7. Met with Ms. Hruby, Mr. Sterling, and WSSC representatives regarding needed action to remove the stop work order on the water line project. At the time of the meeting, WSSC had not provided the information for staff to review and process.
8. Met with staff regarding personnel and operational matters.
9. In follow-up to my presentation last month, I attended the Goddard Contractor Association meeting where Mayor Jordan and Ms. Liggins made a presentation.
10. Attended the Dayton Development Coalition's Ohio congressional reception held during the 35<sup>th</sup> annual Congressional Fly-in. The 14-county region was recently named #2 in U.S. economic development and is a recognized leader in several areas including aerospace. While the City and region could be seen as a competitor, Coalition executives and several entities have offered support as Greenbelt develops an economic development program.
11. Attended the International City/County Management Association Northeast Regional Conference; visiting New York area community based arts organizations with youth and workforce development initiatives post-conference.
12. The Friends of the Old Greenbelt Theater requested from Recreation staff the use the former adult day care space or the Gym for summertime youth programs. Mr. Varda shared that the lower level space is not large enough and the gym is used by summer camps. Potential alternative spaces to maintain operations and support revenue could include school and the library facilities.


### **ARTS:**
