

Re: Draft Letter to Council Member Todd Turner

In previous correspondence to the County on the Comprehensive Review Draft of the proposed Zoning Ordinance, the City and GHI has requested that a Legacy Residential Planned Community Zone (L-R-P-C) be included in the legislative draft of the proposed Zoning Ordinance, to address the proposed deletion of the R-P-C zone. The L-R-P-C Zone would remain in effect until a Greenbelt Neighborhood Conservation Overlay Zone is approved by the County, providing certain protections to Historic Greenbelt. In light of no Legacy R-P-C Zone being included in the legislative draft of the proposed Zoning Ordinance (also referred to as CB-13-2018), GHI is proposing a joint letter be sent to Council Member Turner reiterating the request for a Legacy R-P-C Zone.

A draft letter is included in Council's packet for review and approval.

Dear Mr. Turner:

Thank you for your letter of May 9, 2018, to Greenbelt Homes, Inc., informing us of MNCPPC planning staff's intent to move forward with the development of a Neighborhood Conservation Overlay Zone (NCOZ) for GHI and other historic parts of Greenbelt to be adopted concurrently with the County Wide Map Amendment. Both GHI and the City of Greenbelt are grateful for your support.

GHI's Zoning Task Force, in collaboration with the City, has made considerable progress in drafting the elements of an NCOZ that we believe will protect our historic community, while at the same time offering us the flexibility we have traditionally enjoyed in making necessary repairs and improvements to our property.

Both the City and GHI believe, however, that it will be best to preserve a Legacy Residential Planned Community (R-P-C) Zone, as we have previously requested from you and from M-NCPPC, to protect us in the event that NCOZ development does not proceed as smoothly or in as timely a fashion as we hope. GHI's mission, in partnership with the City, is to provide quality homes for the member-owners of its buildings, some of which date back to the 1930s. Often that means the ability to move forward on maintenance and improvements that cannot wait for an uncertain permitting or regulatory framework to take shape.

We will appreciate your continuing to advocate for the inclusion of this legacy zone in the legislative draft of the zoning ordinance now in front of the County Council (CB-13-2018) and look forward to working with M-NCPPC on a Greenbelt NCOZ. Thank you again.

- Met with Aquatic and Fitness Center staff to review various items related to programming, operations and upcoming events and activities.
- Attended Department Head staff meeting.
- Staff is reviewing and preparing information to make recommendation on purchase of new cardio fitness equipment at the Aquatic and Fitness Center.
- Univision was given a permit to shoot footage for a program focusing on scholarships awarded to students around the country. This year a local student who attends Eleanor Roosevelt High School was one of the recipients to be highlighted in the program.

YOUTH CENTER/ SPRINGHILL LAKEGREENBELT KIDS:

- Summer Camps and classes are in their second week! We have a few spots open in a few of our camps and classes, so sign up soon if you're looking for something for yourself or your family members this summer.
- Kinder Camp, for children ages 3 1/2 -5 years of age, continued the camp season with a "Places You'll Go, People You'll See" theme. Crafts, games, and snacks are all linked to the theme. Kinder campers enjoyed two visits to the pool and a field trip to Greenbelt Theatre for a session of Story time on Screen.
- Camp Pine Tree enjoyed lots of outdoor games, sports, swim lessons, arts & crafts and our outdoor ga-ga pit. Campers embraced the Stone Age by making their own volcanos and creating cookies with a dinosaur fossil design. This week Camp Pine Tree 1 visited Port Discovery in Baltimore and Camp Pine Tree 2 enjoyed a visit to Ripley's Believe It or Not Museum. On Friday all campers enjoyed our annual Camp Carnival!
- Creative Kids campers took part in music, drama, dance, art, juggling and writing classes and performed their first session production of "Magic in the Attic" on Friday at both 10am and 2pm at the Greenbelt Community Center.
- Camp YOGO campers traveled to Adventure Park USA and to Delta, PA for a visit to Guppy Gulch Water Park. While at home in Greenbelt, campers enjoyed group games, sports, swimming and socializing. The week ended with the annual Camp Carnival on Friday.
- Camp Encore continued work on their production of Cymbeline. Roles have been cast and our teen performers are hard at work preparing for the performance in July!
- Springhill Lake Recreation Center is busy with drop-in programs, as well as Basketball Skills and Eagle Vision classes.
- Youth Center staff welcomed a new staff member at their quarterly staff meeting on Thursday.
- Planning and preparation for the July 4th Celebration at Buddy Attick Park continued.
- Continuing to plan Fall programs and enter data in RecTrac as part of the Fall Activity Guide publication process.

PARK RANGERS:

- Greenbelt T-ball group using SHP pavilion during permitted group time, but permit group ended up cancelling due to weather.
- No reports of issues at dog park; max count was 4-5 dogs.
- Picked up trash at BAP and SHP.

AQUATIC AND FITNESS CENTER:

- GMST morning practices started in the outdoor pool on June 21. The first GMST home meet is scheduled for Saturday, June 30. The outdoor pool will open at 1 pm that day.
- Weekday session I of Children's Swim Lessons concluded on Friday. Greenbelt residents can register for session II beginning July 2-3. Open registration begins July 5.
- Thirty-nine kids with Howard County Recreation & Parks Adventure Camps enjoyed the GAFC outdoor pool on Monday from 10:15am to 3:30pm.
- Hot tub closed for regular bi-weekly cleaning on Wednesday from 12pm to 8pm.
- Greenbelt Municipal Swim-a-thon fundraiser event was held in the outdoor pool on Wednesday from 8pm to 10pm.
- Membership renewal reminder email sent to members on Tuesday.
- GAFC half-summer memberships are on sale. Memberships are valid from July 1 through September 3.
- GAFC Swim Instructor(s) provided 16 private swim lessons and Aqua Training sessions (Friday-Thursday).
- Three households have received a credit for the two missed Youth Swim Lessons due to school being in session on June 19 and 20.
- A new candidate for Lifeguard Position was interviewed.

COMMUNITY CENTER:

- The facility hosted the Primary Election on Tuesday. The biggest challenge was electioneers blocking traffic in the parking lot; the judges and staff had to remind them more than five times to move to the sidewalk.
- The Gym is experiencing extreme fluctuations in humidity levels. It has resulted in discomfort for patrons and campers. Public Works has been notified.
- Supervisor and Coordinator met with a pattern renter to resolve payment and reservation issues.
- Supervisor continued to field inquiries in regard to food operation rentals for the Commercial Kitchen. There have been 318 inquiries since April 2015. There are currently six food operations who received all permits and may rent the Kitchen.
- There were 6 facility reservations processed.
- There were 7 private rentals and 12 pattern rentals.

ARTS:

- Summer arts classes are now in session. The Arts Program is also supporting Creative Kids Camp with camp-day ceramics activities for all campers, daily after-camp wheel and hand-building classes, and production and backstage support for their shows.
