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

Proposed Agenda Items for the City of Greenbelt-GHI Work Session on 7-16-18

a) Disposal of Tree Waste at the City's Northway Fields

Until a few years ago, GHI's employees and contractors were allowed to deposit the following tree waste items at the City's Northway Fields:

- a) Leaves that GHI's employees picked up from common areas.
- b) Leaves that contractors removed from gutters of homes.
- c) Wood chips and tree trunks resulting from tree maintenance work that our contractors performed.

While GHI's employees are still allowed to deposit leaves at the Northway site that they remove from common areas, the City does not currently allow GHI's contractors to deposit leaves, wood chips and tree trunks at the Northway Fields.

GHI requests that the City permit our contractors to deposit tree waste at the Northway Fields as they were allowed to do until a few years ago.

b) Playground Agreement with the City of Greenbelt re: Seven GHI-Owned Playgrounds

GHI and the City of Greenbelt are parties to an agreement whereby the City maintains seven GHI-owned playgrounds and GHI pays 25% of the costs for playground improvements that the City undertakes. The agreement states that the City and GHI shall be responsible for procuring and maintaining liability insurance on the playgrounds.

GHI would like to discuss the following issues:

- a) Do all seven GHI-owned playgrounds fully comply with the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) and/or ASTM standards for public playgrounds?
- b) How often are the playgrounds inspected?
- c) Have the inspectors obtained special training to undertake the playground inspections?
- d) Does the City maintain a file of playground accidents that have occurred?
- e) Could the City provide copies of playground inspection reports to GHI in future?

c) WSSC's Proposal to Replace Water Pipes for GHI's Masonry Homes

The underground water pipes for the original (mostly masonry) Greenbelt buildings were installed during 1935-37. In a 1958 agreement signed by the Washington Sanitary Suburban Commission (WSSC), the City of Greenbelt, and Greenbelt Homes, Inc. (GHI), WSSC took ownership of the water piping up to the meter boxes located at the housing units. The meter boxes are approximately 5 feet away from the front walls of the buildings.

In 2008, the WSSC first proposed to replace the water pipes and install new meter boxes in the same locations as the current ones. Subsequent proposals moved the meter boxes close to the

streets and required GHI to assume responsibility for the future maintenance and replacement of the water pipes from the meter boxes to the homes; a future unexpected expense that GHI staff estimated to be \$1,514,400.00 (in 2013 dollars) at the end of the estimated life of the pipes.

After GHI did not agree to the final proposal, WSSC informed GHI in 2012, that it had abandoned the project, but would continue to repair leaks to water pipes on an emergency basis as they fail.

Last May, WSSC informed GHI that it proposes to move forward with the current design of water and sewer main projects for masonry homes; whereby WSSC will install the water meters at the perimeters of serviceside yards and adjacent to sidewalks. WSSC stated that it will continue to be responsible for the maintenance and repair of the additional on-property pipe for 30 years from the date of project completion.

GHI is very appreciative of the efforts of the City Council and Mayor in bringing about a resumption of discussions with WSSC on the project. GHI is currently formulating its response and hopes that representatives from the City of Greenbelt will join us during forthcoming discussions with WSSC on its recent proposal.

d) Welcome Sign at Southway Road

GHI's Board of Directors would like to know whether the City of Greenbelt has plans to either refurbish or replace the 'Welcome to Greenbelt' sign that is located at the entrance of Southway Rd.

e) Resolution of Right-of -way Encroachment Issues

During 1996 through 2003, GHI hired a consulting firm to survey and plot the legal boundaries of GHI property. In 2005, City staff submitted a draft memorandum of understanding to GHI with suggested guidelines for resolving issues with GHI units and yards that encroached on the City rights of way. GHI's Board of Directors did not approve the Memorandum of Understanding at that time.

During 2009 to 2012, GHI & City staff collaborated to address a significant right-of-way encroachment of eight (8) GHI homes along Crescent Road, concluding in the City abandoning the rights-of-way at this location. During 2014 to 2017, collaborations between GHI and City staff also resulted in the re-designation of rights of way at the following locations to eliminate significant encroachment problems:

- 9A-D Hillside Rd
- 11A Hillside Rd and 11H Hillside Rd
- 13A-D Hillside Rd
- 35A Ridge Rd
- 7J Research Rd

Remaining rights of way encroachments can be classified into two categories:

- Category 1 - (81) GHI yard boundaries are outside GHI property lines, but only by about a foot or so.
- Category 2 - (92) natural GHI yard boundaries are outside GHI property lines, but by a more substantial amount.

Based on a directive from GHI's Board, GHI staff requested the City's Planning and Community Development staff in 2016 to prepare a new draft memorandum of understanding for GHI's consideration, regarding yard use and future permitting of improvements for the remaining locations where rights of way encroachments exist. The City's staff has not begun work on this item.

f) P.G. County's Zoning Re-Write Project

GHI is very grateful for the collaborative efforts by the City Council and staff in working with us on matters regarding the zoning re-write project. GHI's Zoning Task Force, in consultation with the City's staff, has made considerable progress in drafting the elements of a Neighborhood Conservation Overlay Zone that will protect our historic community, and offer us the flexibility we have enjoyed in making necessary repairs and improvements to our property.

Most recently, GHI and the City prepared a joint letter to be sent to Councilman Todd Turner stating that it will be best to preserve a Legacy Residential Planned Community (RPC) Zone, to protect us in the event that NCOZ development does not proceed as smoothly as we hope.

g) Proposed Maglev Project

GHI's Board of Directors position of supporting the "No Build" option for the MAGLEV is consistent with the City of Greenbelt's position. The MAGLEV project is currently in the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) stage. A decision by the MD Department of Transportation and the Federal Railroad Administration to proceed, will not be made until the EIS is completed, which is currently scheduled for December 29.

GHI will continue to monitor this process and work with the City Council, County Council, State and Federal representatives, so our position continues to be heard on this project.

h) Proposals Floated to Widen the BW Parkway

Proposals have been floated by Governor Larry Hogan to widen the Baltimore-Washington Parkway. GHI's Board of Directors has voted to take the position of not supporting any widening of the Baltimore Washington Parkway or Beltway in a way that would impact the lands owned by GHI.

GHI will continue to collaborate with the City of Greenbelt and our state and federal delegations in advocating the Board's position.


i) Notification of Road Maintenance Projects Undertaken in the GHI Community

One prior complaint was re-inspected.



YOUTH CENTER/SPRINGHILL LAKE/GREENBELT KIDS:

- Summer camps and classes are now in week 3! We have a few remaining spots in some camps during our remaining three sessions. Sign up soon if you plan to send your child to camp this summer.
- Kinder Camp, for children ages 3 1/2 -5 years of age, started the second session with a theme of “Tall Tales and Superheroes.” Crafts, games, and snacks are all linked to the theme. Kinder campers enjoyed two visits to the pool and a trip to the Wizard of Oz Playground at Watkins Park.
- Camp Pine Tree enjoyed lots of outdoor games, sports, swim lessons, arts & crafts and modified their schedule to more indoor activities due to the heat wave this week. Our campers enjoyed “Mummies in the Morning” camp theme day on Tuesday in celebration of our travel through time to the Egyptian era. Campers walked up to the Greenbelt Theatre on Thursday and watched Paddington 2!
- Creative Kids campers took part in music, drama, dance, art, juggling and writing classes, and began preparing for session 2’s production of Magic in the Attic. Our show of Magic in the Attic is a 20th anniversary production of the very first Creative Kids Camp musical. Our next shows are Friday, July 13 at 10am and 2pm at the Community Center.
- Camp YOGO campers traveled to Above & Beyond Adventure Program at Edgeley Grove, which features a ropes course and climbing wall. COMMUNITY CENTER:
