

## City Manager's Report Week Ending September 7, 2018

1. Thank you to everyone who helped plan and staff Labor Day activities including the Festival, art shows, parade, recreation and museum activities. Great job by Recreation, Police, and Public Works, Animal Control and Museum. Every department supported the effort, particularly Public Information employees who along with staff and volunteers braved the heat, humidity and rain to support a great weekend. Even with challenges like a truck hitting the City's overhead infrastructure (connecting internet services) matters were handled quickly and with professionalism. Again, I appreciate everyone's hard work.
2. In follow-up to the USDA BARC work session, staff communicated vendor information traffic monitoring equipment to the director who attended the meeting, briefed on the status of the Kenilworth Road extension (on hold at the State CTP since 2008), and distributed and posted BARC's urban agriculture event information. <http://apps.roads.maryland.gov/WebProjectLifeCycle/ProjectInformation.aspx?projectno=PG9491116>
3. Please find attached preliminary concept plans for the redevelopment of Beltway Plaza. The Beltway Plaza redevelopment team will be introducing the project to the Advisory Planning Board next Wednesday night. I expect APB to discuss the project over multiple meetings, followed by City Council work session(s). Certainly there will be multiple staff meetings as well.
4. Attached is the Police Department's statistical report for July 2018.
5. Also attached is the final summer camp registration report.
6. Staff is following up with the planning board member on mapping that shows the status of bike, pedestrian, and mobility plan improvements.
7. In follow-up to Council member Pope's injury, Code Enforcement has taken enforcement action on the Edmonston Road construction debris pile. Passersby will notice that an additional waste container was delivered.
8. Staff, inspection and directors, have met with Woodlawn LLC representatives regarding the outstanding work at Central Park that remains to be completed before the Park can be turned over to the City. This includes what has been described as turf, concrete and miscellaneous work. The heat has not supported turf work.
9. Circulating is a survey on the animal care supervisor. This is being sent to all Planning and police staff, directors, and groups such as Greenbelt Community Animal Response Team (GCART) and WAGS.

10. Attended the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments Chief Administrative Officers' Meeting.
11. In follow-up to this week's Letter to the Editor regarding a complaint about the driver of a city vehicle, Police Chief Bowers is assigning staff to investigate.
12. Attached is information on upcoming WSSC construction at the Roosevelt Center. This information was previously sent via email.
13. Anticipated completion of the Green Ridge House smoking area is expected next week. Concrete has been poured and should cure this week. Railing needs to be installed.
14. Attached are draft letters regarding the Maglev – although Ms. Lupe Grady is already working on the School Board to voice opposition, a letter is attached. A similar draft letter is also attached for the new County Council. Mayor Jordan has requested similar letters to Ms. Valentino Smith and Mr. Peters.
15. Included separately is a thank you letter regarding a police matter.
16. Met with staff regarding personnel and operational matters.
17. Attended the September 5, 2018 Metropolitan Council of Governments Chief Administrative Officers Meeting (I think this was already in there).
18. Attached separately is a draft press release on the Open Meetings Compliance Board findings. Please review and comment so that the document can be distributed along with the opinion next week.
19. Mayor Jordan reported that during his and Ms. Terri Hruby's participation at the CB-25 Hearing, the County Council has delayed consideration of the legislation until October. Both stayed to monitor discussion on the County Zoning Ordinance Re-write.
20. Included separately is a copy of the City's Emergency Operations Plan. It has been updated to reflect personnel changes, updated contact information, etc. Other Appendices have not yet been updated. It also includes the Animal Emergency Response Annex recently developed by CART. Please note: Many of the Appendices include confidential information and are only provided to Council and senior staff.
21. Also included in Council's packet is information from the MML Legislative Committee provided by Mayor Pro Tem Davis.
22. Assistant City Manager







CITY FOUND TO NOT HAVE VIOLATED OPEN MEETINGS ACT

On June 7, 2018, the City of Greenbelt was notified of a complaint against the City Council filed with the State of Maryland. The complaint stated that the City had violated the Open Meetings Act by not posting Advisory Planning Board minutes on the City website for 2017. No request for these meeting minutes was made directly to the City by the complainant. Upon receiving notification of the complaint, the City discovered that the minutes, while complete and adopted, had inadvertently not been posted following the departure of a former employee during a time of staff transition. Meeting minutes, in both draft and adopted form, are available for review and/or take away in hard copy from the City.

On August 22, 2018, the State of Maryland Open Meetings Compliance Board sent a formal letter to the City of Greenbelt. According to the Open Meeting's Compliance Board opinion, "We see no sign that the board selectively posted its minutes, purposefully delayed posting them or denied the complainant the opportunity to inspect them. Further, the minutes are now posted, and some were posted quickly anyway. Given these circumstances, we find that the oversight did not rise to the level of a violation of the Act."

"In conclusion, we find that neither the board nor the Council violated the Act. Also, we ask members of the public to seek information from public bodies before invoking our procedures. Here, a visit to City Hall or a Public Information Act request would likely have yielded the minutes, and brought the oversight to staff's attention, more efficiently than this complaint."

The City of Greenbelt has implemented several new ways in which to keep the City of Greenbelt constituents informed. Earlier this year, a robust notification system made it easier to sign up for various types of notifications from the City of Greenbelt. In addition, the City uses many different social media platforms and

will be launching a new, more interactive website the week of September 17, 2018. The City prides itself in providing information to the citizens in many different ways. “We are always looking to improve the way we communicate to all our residents. Suggestions on communication improvements are always welcome and encouraged,” stated Public Information and Communications Coordinator, Beverly Palau.
