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

## City Manager's Report Week Ending May 20, 2016

1. Christal Batey, Community Resource Advocate, and I met with representatives of Maryland Care, a provider of adult medical day care. Ms. Batey learned of Maryland Care at a conference and that they are looking to expand in Prince George's County (they have one site in south County). They were very impressed with the services the City offers for seniors. Will keep you advised.
2. Met with Mayor Pro Tem Davis on suggested revisions to GATE MOU. A clean copy will be forwarded to you next week.
3. The City's FY 2017 Community Parks & Playground grant application (Community Center playground) was denied. The attached notification letter indicates that the applications far exceeded available funding. This is the first time an application from the City has not been approved.
4. Attached is the resume of Mary Kolar. She is a graduate student at the William Donald Schaefer School of Public Policy. She is one of two MML interns this summer and will be interning with us. Ms. Kolar's interest is in housing affordability, so she will be expanding on the work of Mark Perlman, the last MML intern here in Greenbelt. She will also be working on performance measurement. She will start on June 6 and will be introduced at the Council meeting that evening. She will attend the MML conference in June as well. We are excited to have her this summer!

As growing partisan division drives increasing gridlock at the federal level, the prospects for meaningful policy change rest more and more with state and local governments. As I plan for my future in public policy, I see the opportunity to make real impact at the municipal level and hope to explore careers with local government.

When I began my career, I worked for several years in the affordable housing field in New York City, organizing Section 8 tenants at acute risk of losing the affordability of their homes in the face of rapid gentrification. It was affective and inspiring, even transformative, to work with these tenants, watching them come together to preserve their buildings and their communities. But as the years went by, I started to develop a sense of frustration. Preserving housing for low-income people building by building, while important work, was not addressing the deeper issue of declining affordability. Indeed, in networking with other organizers and advocates around the country, it became clear that housing shortages were a nation-wide problem. While I loved my work in New York, I decided I wanted to work more directly on federal policy, and moved back to the Washington, DC area, where I was raised.

After several months of local advocacy in Arlington, Virginia, I began a job at the National Low Income Housing Coalition and over the next several years was able to do the work I had hoped to when leaving New York. NLIHC is a highly mission-driven organization doing critical work. I am deeply proud of what they do and the ways I was able to contribute to that work. But amid increasing partisan divides on Capitol Hill, concerns over the deficit, and growing hostility toward many social programs, I found much of what we ended up doing amounted to pleading

for resources and staving off funding cuts to crucial housing programs. As bleak as the outlook often was, I found real hope in the progress our members across the country were achieving at the state and local levels. In the face of shrinking resources from the federal government, they were designing and implementing innovative strategies to address needs on the ground. These efforts were clearly not without their challenges, but housing advocates saw myriad more opportunities for change in their states, and especially in their local communities. Watching creative and productive partnerships develop among advocates and municipal government officials, I felt a growing desire to pursue a career at the local level. As I left NLIHC and began graduate school, I knew I would likely pursue opportunities not at the federal level but with the state, a county, or city.

In my position as Philanthropy Fellow with the Community Foundation of the National Capital Region this year, I have seen that not only advocates and municipal governments, but also the business and philanthropic sectors, have roles to play in partnerships advancing creative strategies to improve local communities. This semester I am taking a course on rebuilding declining cities. Examining the reasons for post-industrial decline, the current challenges, the windows of hope for the future, and the different policies that have the potential to make those hopes real has been eye-opening and has further strengthened my desire to pursue a career at the municipal level.

I would deeply appreciate the opportunity to participate in the Maryland Municipal League Internship and Fellowship Program, and feel it aligns exactly with my experience and career goals. Thank you for your consideration.
