

City Manager's Report Week Ending November 20, 2015

1. Attached is a letter and email about the County and the Clean Water Partnership possibly offering to dredge the Greenbelt Lake forebays as a project to help the County meet its storm water management goals. This work would be done at no expense to the City. Permission has been granted to allow survey and assessment work to be done. When this is done, a briefing will be scheduled for City Council probably in about 60 days.
2. Attached is a copy of the letter being delivered to residents in the Greenspring II and Lakewood neighborhoods. They are the next ones to receive the wheeled recycling carts. 225 carts have been purchased with the extra funds budgeted by Council for this initiative.
3. Included is a memo on the local legislation which has been pre-filed with the Prince George's County delegation.
4. Included in your envelope is information on the memorial services for former City Clerk Gudrun "Gudi" Mills.
5. Met with County Council member Mary Lehman along with Mayor Jordan and Celia Craze, Director of Planning and Community Development. Ms. Lehman wanted to convey some concerns she had heard about the Animal Shelter. After hearing the concerns and providing her with information about the operation, programs, animals cared for, and the relation with the County Animal Management Division, she seemed satisfied.
6. Held overview meeting with the Hyattsville Community Development Corporation along with Terri Hruby, Assistant Planning Director, and Beverly Palau, Public Information Coordinator, on their project of Next Steps for Economic Development. The initial focus is adding economic development information to the website. Both Berwyn Heights and College Park have recently spoken with them about possibly doing work for them.
7. Chief Craze, Dale Worley, David Moran and I participated on a conference call briefing by the FBI about the possibility of terrorism in the region following the attacks in Paris. The same briefing is being given to the COG Board. The FBI indicates there is no credible evidence of a specific threat in the region or nation at this time. However, representatives from WMATA, DC Homeland Security and COG Emergency Management Committee noted that they are all operating in an elevated posture. The region will be stressing "See Something, Say Something."

8. Assistant City Manager
 - a. Researched local bills under consideration by the Prince George's Delegation.
 - b. Along with IT Director, met with representatives of Everbridge, the City's emergency alert provider.

9. Finance Department
 - a. Completed the Unified Financial Report for FY2015 and submitted it electronically to the State Auditor.
 - b. Completed October 2015 Financial Report which is attached to this report. The city's finances are on target.
 - c. Began updating budget worksheet for FY2017.

Dear Ms. Hruby,

As you know Soltesz is working with the Clean Water Partnership (CWP) to help Prince George's County meet the required stormwater management retrofit goals that are identified in the current Nonpoint Source Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit that is issued by the State of Maryland Department of the Environment (MDE). We would like to propose to the City of Greenbelt that the CWP dredge and maintain the two (2) existing fore bays in Buddy Attick Lake Park. This work will ~~include~~ *improve* the overall water quality in the lake and reduce sediment loads to the deeper parts of the lake.

Subject to City of Greenbelt approval, our team will prepare all drawings and specifications and obtain all applicable Prince George's County, Federal, and MDE permits for the project. We will also obtain any applicable City of Greenbelt permits and work with your City departments and citizen groups to make sure that this project meets all of your community development and environmental goal. Subject to receiving the necessary approvals and permits from County and State authorities, we will then install all sediment and erosion controls and dredge and dispose of the material. The site will be stabilized and restored. The CWP will also maintain the fore bay for 30 years. We intend to do this work with local Prince George's County engineering and construction firms and citizens. The CWP would then report the treated acreage to Prince George's County DoE and MDE for credit.

We would like to review the program with the City of Greenbelt at your convenience. However, if this proposal is of interest to you, we would need to survey the fore bays and request that you issue the necessary "permit" to do so.

SUBJ: Prince George's Local Bills

Attached is a list of all the local bills that the Prince George's House Delegation is considering for the 2016 Session. These were the subject of the Delegation Public Hearing on November 16. Staff has done an initial review of this list. Below are several bills of potential interest to Greenbelt:

MC/PG 109 creates an "Extraordinary Development District" in Prince George's County for the purposes of Tax Increment Financing (TIF). This district must be designated by County Council Resolution and must contain at least 50 acres on which a Federal Law Enforcement Agency would be located (seem directed at the FBI relocation). Subject to an agreement between the County Council and the Commission, M-NCCPC taxes in this district would be included in the TIF. This bill was introduced at the request of the County Executive.

PG 404 establishes a County-wide plastic bag fee of up to 5 cents.

PG 408 would require multi-family dwellings in Prince George's County where access to individual units is restricted to designate a public area for campaign literature 60 days prior to a primary or general election. This law already applies to Montgomery County.

PG 412 would establish a program that allows low income elderly or disabled homeowners to defer their property tax. Deferred taxes and interest would be due when the owner dies or sells the property.

PG 420 Delegate Washington had introduced a bill that would allow for up to 3 Community Benefit Districts in the County. These districts would provide supplemental security and maintenance activities, as well as promote and market the district. The district could levy a special tax to cover the cost of these services. This bill has been withdrawn.

PG 432 sets a 15% higher property tax rate on vacant lots or improved property that is vacant and neglected.

Revenues

Revenues are 65.6% of the adopted budget compared to 65.1% a year ago and 69.6% in the most recent five fiscal years. Real estate revenue is currently \$216,000 below the adopted budget. This amount will be supplemented by a three quarter, half and quarter year assessments when construction is ongoing. As a result of new construction in Greenbelt Station, the three quarter year assessment will result in \$56,000 of additional real estate tax revenue next month. While this is good news, it is now estimated that real estate revenue will end FY 2016 short of the adopted budget by approximately \$120,000.

Red light and speed camera revenues are \$20,000 and \$6,000 ahead of their pace a year ago, respectively. The combined adopted budget for these revenues in FY 2016 is \$650,000. A repeat of their FY 2015 performance would result in more than \$900,000 in revenue this fiscal year.

As expected, Aquatic & Fitness Center revenue is lagging as result of closing the facility for the roof repair. Currently, revenue is \$40,000 lower than a year ago. Revenue at the Community Center is lower as well. Adult day care rental receipts are approximately \$10,000 in arrears and are the primary reason Community Center revenues are lower than the historical trend.

Overall, FY 2016 revenues appear to be on track to meet the needs of the City.

Expenditures

Total operating expenditures are 32.0% of the adopted budget compared to 32.7% in FY 2015 and 33.1% historically. Salaries and benefits are within operating norms as well, 31.9% compared to 32.9% historically. Police salaries are \$90,000 lower than a year ago that is in part due to two vacancies. These savings have been partially offset with higher overtime costs of \$27,000.

The City has lowered its expenditures by \$30,000 for motor vehicle fuel compared to a year ago. The most recent purchase of gasoline was \$2.02 per gallon. At this time, there is no upward pressure on gasoline prices and should result in continued savings for this commodity in the near future. . Building maintenance is \$30,000 higher. Most of this increase is the result of HVAC work at the Police Station and Community Center.

The attached expenditure worksheet shows that worker compensation insurance is \$60,000 over budget. Currently, Chesapeake Employer's Insurance is offering a \$38,000 overpayment credit for premiums paid in FY 2015. However, the City believes the credit should be \$55,000. Therefore, worker compensation insurance will likely end the fiscal year between \$5,000 and \$22,000 higher than the adopted budget.

The City has appealed the worker compensation audit with the Maryland State Insurance Commissioner. It is expected that the appeal will require several months to be completed.

After four months of the fiscal year complete, expenditures appear to be in line with the adopted budget.
